Federal Grants Provide New Law Enforcement Vehicles

2009 from the Department of Homeland Security under their program known as "Operation Stone Garden" (OPSG). The three grants totalled \$239,567.

"Stone Garden" funds are distributed to local law enforcement agencies, including Indian Tribes, to enhance law enforcement preparedness and operational readiness along the borders of the United States.

Arizona state agencies also received \$7,223,737 from the Federal Government in 2009 to share with other agencies. Those grants will go to fund overtime and equipment in patrolling and securing the international border with Mexico.



The backup generators provide 150% coverage of the Q's designed demand. With

From February 1st to February 4th, Quechan Fish and Game Officer Travis Owl joined the Yuma Marine Station Interdiction Unit's training cadre to complete the Customs and Border Protection (CPB) Crewman Certification Course.

They were also schooled in Law and Authority (the legal and maritime laws that give Customs authority for boarding other vessels) and docking.

The second day of the class found them on the Colorado River between Squaw Lake and Martinez Lake, as the topics introduced on day 1 were demonstrated in what law enforcement professionals refer to as a "scenario based environment". Students were tested on both compliant and non-compliant encounters, pursuit drills, and vessel handling.

IID ultimately agreed that the Tribe would develop the substation at its cost, and that the Tribe would own the substation. The agreement allows the Tribe to determine whether to extend services from the substation, and cost of constructing a service line from IID's existing 34.5


