

A TIMELINE OF THE QUECHAN CASINO RESORT

Construction officially began on Thursday, June 14, 2007 with the Quechan Tribal Council, management of the existing Paradise Casinos and representatives of the Freidmutter Group and ROEL Construction breaking ground for the project. Originally scheduled to open in November of 2008, the Tribal Council asked for additional surveys to insure that no cultural artifacts in the area would be disturbed by the project. During that time, negotiations were completed with the Imperial Irrigation District to move a powerline that crossed the middle of the site, and the subsequent delay fed increasing tension over what some tribe members viewed as a sacred area.

Finally, the Quechan Tribal Council put the question to the entire voting membership of the tribe, holding a special referendum election on October 18th of that year. Voters approved moving forward with construction at the current location at Interstate 8 and Algodones Road by a margin of 6 to 4. By late November of 2007, site preparation began in earnest as trailers and heavy equipment moved in (below) and began to lay in the roads and drainage for the coming resort.





Tribal monitors were present every day of the project, keeping track of sensitive locations. Any time a possible artifact was discovered, the area was fenced off against intrusion. The heavy equipment in the view above is working where the south parking lot now sits, and the groundbreaking took place about where the trailers in the center can be seen.

Time Coming: A Construction History

Over The Past 19 Months - From The Groundbreaking in 2007 To the Finishing touches!



By March 2008 the elevator towers were going up and the foundation was in for the Hotel wing. Things would move more rapidly once the concrete for the walls was being poured.



Framing of the Casino and Pipa Event Center shot into the sky in this view taken only 6 weeks later. ROEL began to overlap work shifts to keep things on-track during the summer.



By June, the porte-cochére at the center of both wings extends out over the valet entrance, and all five floors of the Hotel are in place, prior to the walls being erected.



A scant four months later, with 4 shifts starting 2 hours apart every evening, the entire building is enclosed, paving begun and the air conditioning is installed and working.

A 2-day job fair is held for Tribe members at the Hundreds of new slot machines, some unavailable anywhere else, begin to be installed on the gaming floor that same month.

The adjacent water storage and treatment facility is completed and begins operation, completing its first shake-down run and receiving certification to operate by the end of January.

Training Begins on Day One - Updated Continually

The prospect of having a new Las Vegas style Casino Resort introduced into the mix of the Yuma economy means more than simply giving the public great new choices in recreational diversion and entertainment. It means the providers of those diversions must step up to the plate and deliver a much higher level of service for their patrons, in keeping with the expectations created upon entering such an opulent building.

So, whether a person visits the Quechan Casino Resort to enjoy a weekend getaway, sampling all the possibilities, staying overnight with a room service breakfast, using the exercise room and sampling the gaming tables before a trip down the lazy river and a romantic dinner at the Ironwood Steakhouse (before they dance the night away in the Sidewinder Lounge), or it's a simple "lunch date" meeting at the Ocotillo Café, every visitor must come to expect a consistently high level of service from every employee, in every capacity.

To meet, and even surpass, those expectations, the management of the new Quechan Casino Resort has spent every day for the past six weeks, interviewing, recruiting and training the staff that will serve as the public face of the new Resort. Since the Employment Center opened on December 9, 2009, over 4000 applications have been received for the 1000 plus positions needing to be filled.

While 327 of those new jobs will go to experienced employees transferring over from the tribe's Paradise Casinos, that still leaves over 650 new people needing an orientation to the tribe's history and culture, the corporate philosophy of the Resort, and detailed training in their own responsibilities within their specific department and position.

With that in mind, Anna Hemmer, Training Manager for the Paradise Casinos, and Patricia Barton, a Human Resources Specialist at Paradise, presented a series of workshops for tribal members last fall. Over 100 Ouechan responded to their invitation, and they received a course that included interview tips, going over communication skills, public appearance, and the importance of puntual attendance in meeting business

In the meantime, the Paradise Casinos Human Resources and Training staff put together a Power Point program for new employees coming in from outside the tribe. The program, presented jointly by Anna Hemmer and Deborah Waitely, serves as the introduction to a half day orientation for new employees. Resort is owned by the Quechan Presented to about 60 employees every day, the Power Point provides training on the history of the tribe, customer service expectations, the new Resort's amenities, and their policies and procedures.

The Quechan history portion begins with the period of the first Spanish influx of the 1500's, to the founding of Fort Yuma under the administration of the U.S. Army, and continues with the coming of the railroad, when trade expanded and times began to change. It then details the hard years under the influence of the Interior Department, when the now vacant Fort Yuma Transferring veteran employ- obligations. Those tribal mem- was used as a boarding school,

and Quechan children were gathered up and taught to speak only English.

It then covers the creation of the Fort Yuma Quechan reservation in 1884, and formation of a Tribal government with the grant of tribal sovereignty in 1936, before proceeding on to the modern era of self sufficiency through business enterprises and Casino revenues.


Further training is also given by Terry Roper, the Quechan Tribe's Safety Coordinator along with Frank White, Benefits and Safety Manager at the Resort, covering the need for safety along with an explanation of employee benefits. Each group is then given a tour of the Resort, where they get their first look at their actual working en-

Each new employee is then introduced to their department head, to receive further job specific training in hotel operations, guest services, casino support or their particular part in the vast flow of food and beverages provided through the all venues within the Resort.

"Each department is already conducting specialty training," says Mrs. Hemmer, who is also a member of the Quechan Tribe herself. "Employees will be trained continuously until grand opening and throughout the year. The focus is on quality customer service."

So, as you enjoy your first visit to this startlingly modern edifice, take note of the service and individual attention you receive. You will probably return soon for more of the same!

Quechan Fish & Game Receives Shipment of Trout



The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) delivered a new batch of young Rainbow Trout to the Quechan Nation on January 26, restocking a popular fishing hole just east of the old power plant near the Canal and Picacho Road.

"They had been promising us this shipment since sometime before Christmas," said tribe's Fish and Game Depart- 10 per day, per angler.

ment. "Since they were a little late, instead of bringing in their normal shipment of tiny fingerlings that need a few months to mature, the USFWS brought in over 4,000 9-inch trout, so they're ready for fishing right now."

Officer Osborne says yearround fishing permits for use on the reservation can be picked up for only \$55.00 at Hub Liquor, the Quechan Tribe's Fish and Game Office on Indian Hill, or at the Laguna Dam RV Park or the Sleepy Hollow Trailer Park (just north of Algodones, Mexico).

Even the slot machines are mounted on cherry stained cabinets, connecting them to state-ofthe-art underfloor data networks. which can be quickly reconfigured to allow dozens of possible layouts (in case more machines are moved in, or some need to be removed for Poker Tournaments on the main floor). Everything you see has been carefully planned to the last detail over the past two years, to insure the ultimate in guest satisfaction. So relax, enjoy, and realize that it was all done for you!
