The Winterhaven Fire Protection District (WFPD) has been "placed on retainer" by the Quechan Tribe, winning the contract to provide first response fire protection and emergency medical support for the new Quechan Casino A Resort on Algodones Road.

The Quechan Tribal Council announced in the last quarter of 2008 that they would accept bids to provide emergency services for the new Resort as a part of the Tribal Gaming Compact with the State of California. Among the agencies responding to the Request for Bids were Winterhaven FPD, Rural Metro and Imperial County. Once the Council and the Tribe's Financial Comptroller looked over the bids, they consulted with Pearl Cowan, the Quechan Tribe's Emergergency Management Director for further advice on the various response times of the agencies, as well as their ability to interface with the local governmental structure.



## Ft. Yuma IHS Clinic Updates

## THE DIABETES CLINIC

The diabetes clinic of Ft. Yuma depression. Blood sugar tests are began operating in late April of 2008, as the result of a "call to action" in order to improve care and outcomes for patients with this chronic disease.

A diabetes team approach implemented to address the many aspects of diabetes care, to ensure that none were missed. Diabetes care consists of many lab tests, patient history and physical exams; looking for other diseases which could complicate treatments: checking weight, blood pressure, thyroid, neurological checks, foot exams, retinal eye exams, medications, diabetes education; and referrals to our dietician, podiatry or ophthalmology departments.

In addition, there must be an EKG test, certain blood and urine tests performed at regular intervals, as well as immunizations. Diabetes patients also require screening for tobacco use and performed, and medication may need to be added or adjusted.

It is easy to see how some parts because there are so many, and patients may have to meet several or ongoing appointments. Patients who have uncontrolled diabetes may need to make extra clinic visits. Others may require regular visits for wound care or complications. Some patients may find it difficult to get to the clinic due to their physical condition or a lack of transportation. In some cases, patients miss appointments and may get behind in their care.

It is a challenge to keep all patients up-to-date with their care; however, the diabetes team is committed to finding creative ways to help this happen.

The diabetes team members receive special training in diabetes management and work to-

gether to help patients meet the recommended standards of treatment for diabetes care.

The diabetes team is made up of diabetes care could be missed, of medical providers: nurses, nursing assistants and a case manager. Other members of the extended diabetes care team include the pharmacist, dietician and community diabetes educator, podiatrist, lab, dentist, JVN vision technician, optometrist or ophthalmologist.

> The diabetes nurse case manager identifies patients who are missing pieces of diabetes care, or who need counseling or education about how to manage their diabetes. This service is available with appointment or by walk-in as available. Patients often report that this service helps them improve their diabetes self-management and gain better control of their condition.

So, what happens at a clinic visit? During patient screening, all patients are asked to take off their shoes, so the nursing staff can perform a brief foot assessment. They look for possible foot problems which can be addressed during the provider visit before any foot problems the patient may have become more serious.

The "Happy Feet" program for our diabetic patients is very popular, and a nurse with special training performs a foot exam, offering hands on foot care and education to patients. Patients enjoy feeling good about their feet, and learn how to better care for them. This service can be arranged by appointment.

The medical providers spend time counseling and educating the patients, as do the nurse case manager, pharmacist, dietician

and others. There are patient literature hand-outs available and diabetes group classes are of-

State of the art glucose meters are issued to patients along with education about blood sugar monitoring. The patients are encouraged to bring the meters back to clinic visits, so that their blood sugar testing results can be downloaded and printed out from a computer.

When patients see their blood sugar results graphed out in color, they suddenly gain a better understanding of how well or how poorly controlled their diabetes is, and can make a specific goal to improve it as needed. Others can see great improvements and can feel a sense of accomplishment. This is a valuable tool for the patients, in taking charge of their own progress.

The wound care nurse is a specialist with specific training on how to get wounds to heal as quickly as possible. She uses the latest techniques and products to help diabetes patients treat wounds, abscesses and ulcers. There is also a medical provider who specializes in wound care. When diabetes is not under control, wounds heal much more slowly and may worsen if not addressed early.

Many diabetes patients experience depression. Diabetes can be overwhelming and challenging. Patients who have identified depression can receive medical attention or support services from mental health counselors. Also, a support group for diabetes patients is being formed.

The clinic dietician can provide medical nutrition therapy (MNT) for diabetes patients, as well as weight management.

If eye problems are found, the JVN technician will take digital images of the patient's retina and send them by computer modem to an ophthalmologist in Phoenix for diagnosis and recommendations. This also helps patients meet the annual eye exam requirement.

The Ft. Yuma Clinic also offers

tobacco cessation help (smoking counseling), with individual and group support classes for those who use tobacco, or who are interested in helping a loved one who uses tobacco.

In the future, the services of an exercise specialist will also become available to the diabetes clinic.

An important philosophy of Ft. Yuma's diabetes clinic is the belief that the patient is at the center of care and is actively involved in decisions about his care. Patients can take charge and gain control of their diabetes by making important decisions.

One way for a patient to take charge is by knowing what tests are needed to take care of his health, and to keep track of them. In this way, patients are managing their diabetes, and the diabetes is not managing them!

Here are some guidelines for diabetes care. Ask about them when you visit the diabetes clinic:

- ▶Get a review of your blood sugar readings, by bringing in your glucose meter or log sheets. The readings should usually fall roughly between 80 and 160. Be sure to request a print-out to take home with you.
- ► Check your blood pressure at every clinic visit and have staff tell you the result. It should be 130/80 or less. If not, are you on any special medication?
- ► Get your weight checked at every clinic visit and get the result. Find out your BMI (Body Mass Index) number and whether you are overweight or not. If so, a referral for help with weight management can be made.
- ► Have a brief foot exam at every visit and a yearly comprehensive foot exam with a monofilament to check for nerve or circulatory damage. Do you know how to check your own feet with a mirror?
- ►The report card of your overall blood sugar control is the A1c Level. Get your blood A1c tested every 3 months and write that number down. It should be less than 7.

test done yearly. Get the serum creatinine test, too. Make sure you are given the results; these are important measures of your kidney function. Long term high blood pressure can damage kidneys. Find out your status!

- exam. If you have eye problems, make sure you get more than one eye exam per year, as needed. You can also get a referral.
- ► See the dentist for a yearly mouth exam. (Diabetes patients tend to have more problems with the mouth and teeth.)
- ► Get your blood fats, or lipids, also known as cholesterol, checked yearly. You should know those numbers! Your total cholesterol should be under 200, with LDL cholesterol under 100, while triglyceride should be below 150. If not, are you on a medication? Do you know how to eat a lower fat diet and get more physical activity?

- ► Are you on a daily aspia higher risk of stroke and heart in diabetes. attack, and taking an aspirin daily helps to prevent this.
- Expect a depression screen every year. If the result shows the possibility of depression, available. There are options!
- ► Ask about your yearly eye management education to learn how to manage your diabetes. Even if you have had classes, if your tuberculosis screening there is always something new to learn as time goes on. Ask about the diabetes case manager who can help you review your personal diabetes care plan and answer your questions.
  - ► Get a yearly flu shot, and the pneumonia shot. Diabetes patients get more complications from the flu than non-diabetes patients do.
  - ► Make sure your tetanus and diphtheria shot is up to date. This shot is given every ten years.
  - ▶Be sure to request a Hepatitis B shot if you have problems with your kidneys.
