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The "Q" Resort Hosts S.W. Border Sheriffs

The Quechan Casino♣Resort Event Center received national attention in September while hosting a three day meeting of the Southwestern Border Sheriffs Coalition.

The meeting brought in hundreds of law enforcement representatives from both sides of the international border, as border county Sheriffs from California, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas gathered with their chief deputies and federal officials from both the United States and Mexico to discuss tactics, report successes and concerns, and browse the latest technology in the detection and interception of both people and contraband.

Although the actual working part of their 3-day conference didn't begin until Tuesday morning, most of the participants were arriving all throughout Monday, September 21st. The Texas officers were particularly apparent, each seemingly well over 6 feet tall and dressed in the obligatory Stetson, pulling their roller equipped luggage through the porte-cochère entry and through the halls of the hotel. They all wanted to

be on time for the poolside reception welcoming both law enforcement and vendors to the Quechan Casino♣Resort and two days of intense discussions on recent trends in illegal border crossings.

The gun battle at the San Ysidro port of entry in San Diego County during their meeting on the 23rd only emphasized the increasing desperation of human smugglers trying to

get their cargo into an increasingly well patrolled U.S. border. And to lighten the mood before diving into the serious business of "homeland security", the resort staff laid out a sumptuous buffet on the pool deck entry to the Event Center, with President Jackson and guest singer Charles Noah, with the Ah Keel Dance Group present to make everyone feel at relaxed and welcome.

Imperial County Sheriff Raymond Loera, whose jurisdiction includes our corner of California, acted as host, with Motorola picking up the tab for dinner and drinks Monday night. Sheriff Loera kept his opening remarks short, promising a full agenda over the two days to come before introducing President Jackson and turning the microphone over to him.

I celebrated my 21st birthday at the Fantasy Springs Pow Wow, and while I never thought I would be celebrating the big 2-1 with family and a bunch of strangers, everyone there knew it was my birthday and I was honored with a birthday song,

dancing with my uncle on one side and my cousin on the other! It is a very good memory that will be with me forever.

The highlight of my Pow Wow circuit (as if Fantasy Springs wasn't enough) was when I was able to attend the 75th annual Little Eagle Pow Wow in South Dakota, along with my grandmother and cousin. I had always heard my late grandpa Howard Bobtail Bear (who was from there) talking about how different their Pow Wows are, and he'd always told them there how we are different here by our having gatherings rather than Pow Wows.

It was a real honor for me to go and represent the Quechan Nation and participate in their Pow Wow. In South Dakota, I was able to show the different dresses we have, such as the diamond, the camp, and the ribbon dress. My Cousin and I even met a drum group that was at the Fantasy Springs Pow Wow. They told me they had enjoyed watching and hearing our style of dance and song while at Fantasy Springs.

I had the privilege to attend the Yuman Language Summit, which was held at the Sycuan Golf Course and Conference Center. At the Summit, I attended different classes and learned many interesting facts and ideas. I also transformed into a model for a quick moment as I participated in their fashion show. I truly can work the run way, or so I think!

I was announced along with the other Native royalty present over the loud speaker and my image was projected on the jumbo screen, but I was so busy waving to the arena I didn't even see myself. I'm glad somebody got a picture for me! That was a really sweet experience.

My wow factor this year came in the form of the opening of The Q. I had the honor to cut the ribbon along with the Tribal Council members for the opening of the Quechan Casino ♠ Resort: both the Tribal and non-tribal opening. I didn't ever think that I could be part of something so monumental, but I was and I am

grateful to have been a part of something so big.

As I have said this year has been an emotional year, a big year for me. I couldn't have done it alone and with that I would like to say thank you to the people who have truly been there for me and have supported me throughout this year.

I would first and foremost like to give a big THANK YOU to my grandmother Marianna Bobtail Bear and my uncle Emilio Escalanti, I don't think there are enough "thank yous" or enough appreciation and gratitude that I could extend to you two.

President Jackson reinforced Sheriff Loera's emphasis on the heavy schedule to come, based on the agenda published for the meeting, and thanked the group for choosing our new resort here on the border as the location for such an important gathering.

"I know you have a busy schedule," he said, "but as you look around you, you will see our CEO, Mr. Brian Parrish and his staff are right here, ready to answer any questions you have, and provide you the support you need throughout your conference. So, please, don't hesitate to ask."

He wrapped up his remarks with a brief mention of how im-

portant law enforcement is, and touched on the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the Quechan Tribe and both Yuma and Imperial Counties, outlining the jurisdictional and investigative responsibilities of those entities in relation to the Quechan Nation. Once finished, President Jackson introduced the Ah Keel Dance Group, and the party began with traditional harvest songs and dances.

Come Tuesday and the official start of the Conference, media representatives descended on the event to interview conferees such as William Newell of the Phoenix Field Division of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) and the Assistant Secretary of state and local law enforcement for the DHS, "Ted" Sexton, Sr.

Both men were on hand to make presentations on the ATF's efforts to stem firearms trafficking along the southwest border, and information sharing by the Department of Homeland Security (DHS).

The Event Center was set up with a central hallway down the center and two large rooms to each side. One room was set up with row upon row of tables

facing a large screen for multimedia briefings, while the other was arranged for serving meals during breaks.

Throughout both Tuesday and Wednesday, participants gathered for a 7:30 AM breakfast before crossing the central hallway to get down to business an hour later. The Chief Patrol Agents for both the Del Rio and Yuma sectors of the U.S. Border Patrol (Randy Hill and Paul Beeson) spoke on the apprehension rates and narcotics seizures in their specific areas, with Agent Beeson also pointing out the Yuma sector's increasing trend of ultra-light aircraft being used by smugglers in their attempts to bring illegal drugs into the US.

Even Mexico sent a representative, in the person of Ariel Moutsatos, the Advisor for International Affairs for Mexico's Attorney General. Señor Moutsatos was interviewed by local television stations, appearing both

nights on the local newscasts.

During the evening between the two-day Conference, participants were shuttled to tour the Yuma Quartermaster Depot and enjoy a steak dinner outdoors along the river. Both the Yuma and Imperial County Sheriff's Poses sponsored that event, with help from Coca Cola and the Coachella Valley Latino Peace Officers Association.

During breaks between lectures, officers with purchasing authority were able to look over tempting displays of the latest tools in long-range detection, communication, contraband interception and vehicles.

Vendors such as Gyrocam Systems and CamerasOnSite had visible light, low light and infrared systems enabling users to observe and locate people at a distance, and accurately mark their position using GPS coordinates on Google Earth maps.

Motorola was showing their

latest computers for mounting in patrol cars, as well as their automatic license plate reader, radios and integrated systems.

TOMCAR, an Israeli/American company was on hand to show their lightweight rough country patrol vehicle that promises "anywhere and back" capabilities. Not to be outdone, Imperial County brought over a selection of their patrol vehicles, ranging from a small ATV to a four-seat sand rail (with a 320 HP Corvette engine!), an armored truck and a boat, along with the usual full sized 4WD trucks.

A final presentation was reserved for Alan Bersin, recently appointed by President Obama as the DHS Special Representative for Border Affairs. Soon after, the conferees settled on the date and place for their next meeting.

Let's hope they enjoyed their stay here, speak well of the facilities, and plan to return for more such meetings in the future.

Women's Health/Breast Cancer Seminar Set for October 8th at QCC

A public seminar to encourage Breast Cancer Awareness will take place on Thursday, October 8 at the Quechan Community Center. Scheduled to run from 8:00 AM to 3:00 PM (with an hour for lunch), the seminar will feature presentations by Cyndy Hale, RNP, the Fort Yuma Women's Healthcare Nurse Practitioner. Her two-hour presentations are currently scheduled to begin at 10:00 AM and just after lunch at 1:00 PM. Lunch is provided.

October is traditionally set aside as Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

This year's seminar at the QCC will also encourage overall health awareness, with free blood pressure checks and glucose screenings and health information booths set up inside the Community Center. Those screenings will be available from 8:00 AM until 10:00 AM.

The program activities are coordinated with through the Quechan Special Diabetes Program, Community Health Representatives, the Quechan Community Center, the Fort Yuma Women's Health Team and the Public Health Nursing Department of the IHS.

With the message that "The best protection is early detection", the seminar will stress that regular mammograms go a long way towards lowering the risk of dying from breast cancer.

Breast cancer is the most common form of cancer in women and the second most common cause of cancer death in American Indian/Alaska Native women. In 2005 (the most recent year numbers are available) 186,467 women and 1,764 men were diagnosed with breast cancer; 41,116 women and 375 men died from the disease.

There are different kinds of breast cancer. The form the cancer takes depends on which cells in the breast turn into cancer. It can begin in different parts of the breast, like the ducts or the glands (or lobules).

Mammograms (X-ray examinations of the breast) are the best method to detect breast cancer early when it is easier to treat and even before it is big enough to feel or cause symptoms.

Having regular mammograms can lower the risk of dying from breast cancer. If you are age 40 years or older, you should have a screening mammogram every 1 to 2 years, according to Nurse

Evelyn M. Morales-Cruz at the Fort Yuma Health Service.

Nurse Morales-Cruz also lists these additional ways to lower your risk:

- Control your weight and exercise. Make healthy choices in the foods you eat and the kinds of drinks you have each day. Stay active.

- Know your family history of breast cancer. If you have a mother, sister, or daughter with breast cancer, ask your doctor what is your risk of getting breast cancer and how you can lower your risk.

- Find out the risks and benefits of hormone replacement therapy. Ask your doctor about the risks and benefits of hormone replacement therapy and find out if hormone replacement therapy is right for you.

- And finally, she says you should limit the amount of alcohol you drink.

She also stresses that it is important to talk to your doctor if you have any breast symptoms or changes in your breast, or if breast cancer runs in your family. He or she may recommend that you have mammograms before age 40 or more often than usual.

New CEO Named for the Fort Yuma Indian Health Service

Lt. Commander Roger Dahozy will take over as CEO of the Fort Yuma Indian Health Clinic next Tuesday, October 13th.

A member of the Navajo Nation, Dahozy managed a budget of over 12 million dollars and a staff of almost 200 at the Fort Defiance Navajo Area IHS.

Roger Dahozy is a member of the Navajo Nation and grew up in Window Rock, Arizona. He received his B.S. Degree in Civil Engineering from Arizona State University in 1999. In 2000 he joined the United States Public Health Service Commissioned Corps.

From 2000 to 2004, LCdr. Dahozy worked as an Environmental Engineer for the Sanitation Facilities Construction program of the Portland and Tucson Areas of IHS. While there, he collaborated with many tribal and private entities, including the City of Seattle, Washington, 12 tribes in the western Washington State area, and the Tohono O'odham Nation in southern Arizona.

In 2004, he accepted the position of Facility Design and Construction Consultant with the

Phoenix Area IHS Office. In that capacity, he managed the overall design, renovation, and construction of various health facilities, working closely with IHS Service Unit staff, Tribal leadership, architects, and construction contractors.

In the summer of 2007, LCdr. Dahozy became the Director of Support Operations for the Fort Defiance Service Unit, Navajo Area IHS. There, he managed a staff of almost 200 with budget of over 12 million dollars and was responsible for all support functions for the Service Unit.

LCdr. Dahozy is completing his graduate studies through Tulane University, where he will soon obtain his Masters of Public Health Degree and is on his way to obtaining his Professional Engineer certification.

Parents with children currently enrolled in the Quechan Head Start Program, as well as those looking forward to having a child enrolled in the next year were invited to bring the whole family in for an Open House visit on the evening of September 24th.

Danette Joaquin, Family Service Manager at Quechan Head Start explained the importance of parental involvement in working together to ensure their goals of education and socialization in preparation for kindergarten. The entire staff, teachers, cooks, maintenance and managers were on hand to give parents a personal tour of the facilities and answer any questions they might have.

"We want them to be familiar

with our facility," she said, "and let them know we have an open door policy. (Parents) can come at any time, and we're always here for the children, because our main goal is what's best for them."

The staff was on hand to answer specific questions on their child's progress, behavior and particular strengths in the classroom environment. Parents who asked about things to come during the "school year" were briefed on milestones they can expect to see as their child develops over the coming year.

With six classrooms this year, evenly divided with 3 each for 3-year olds and 4-year olds, the teaching staff now numbers 15.

Each room has two teachers with the children all day, while additional teachers "float" from room-to-room as needed. With their children's projects and art displayed on the walls, parents had plenty to see and questions to ask at the Open House.

Everyone who visited passed by a registration desk to pick up a coloring book and bracelet. Another table offered free books provided by Reading Is Fundamental (RIF).

After visiting the classrooms, the parents and children got to file into the Education Center's multipurpose room for cookies, punch and popcorn while they watched a fire safety puppet show to end the evening.
