Tribal Court Protective Orders Now Recognized by Imperial County

"Full Faith And Credit" Agreement Reached in Meetings With ICSO, Imperial County Judge and Tribal Court Judge White

Quechan Tribal Judge Claudette White has returned from a successful meeting involving both Imperial County Sheriff's representatives and Judge Uolla of the Juvenile Division of Imperial County's Superior Court.

The October 27, 2010 meeting was held to negotiate the compliance of Imperial County in honoring the "Full Faith and Credit" of Tribal Court Orders.

At that meeting, the parties have agreed to process Domestic Violence Protective Orders from the Tribal Court. They have further agreed to meet again at a later time to discuss other Tribal Court Order procedures.


