Quechan Tribal Member Renee White Eyes was appointed to the position of Admissions Officer/Native American Recruiter in the Undergraduate Admission and Relations with Schools Department at UCLA in December 2010, after serving a little over a year at Mental Health America of San Diego County as their Outreach Specialist in Urban Native American Communities.

Born in Lancaster, California, Renee and her family moved to Wrightwood, CA when she was 14, where she attended and graduated from Serrano High School. After high school, she attended Victor Valley College and California State University, San Marcos.

"I was extremely fortunate to have a counselor at Victor Valley who really prepared me for the transfer process," she tells the Quechan News. "Because process, I felt confident in what I was doing and knew exactly what my next steps would be once I transferred. Once at CSU San Marcos, I already knew who my counselor was and what was needed to finish my degree. However, I ended up switching majors and was not sure what I wanted to do after college."

Fight To Conquer Diabetes Is The Focus of Longest Walk 3

The entire group stopped in the empty lot set aside for construction of the new Indian Health Service Hospital for a sage smoke ceremony, followed by blessings and a traditional dances before continuing on to the Paradise Event Center for a meal hosted by the Quechan Tribe. The following day, a five-hour educational/celebratory program was held at the Diabetes Walking Park, where Dennis Banks explained the goals he holds in common with the Kwat'san Pipa: to eradicate diabetes among Native Americans within a generation. After a night's rest at the Community Center, everyone gathered at the Quechan Senior Center, where volunteers such as Spirit Runner Daniel Hunter helped the group load snack fruit and water for their trip before accompanying them on their walk's next leg, to Gila Bend. Mr. Banks also announced that the Quechan Nation's fight for a new, up-to-date, full-service Hospital on the Reservation is now also his fight. He savs it is now one of the chief demands of the Longest Walk 3 when they arrive in Washington, D.C. on July 8th. He also wants the federal government to return 2 Million acres of farmland to the Indian peoples of the United States to allow for growing fresh fruits and vegetables, in order to return the Native people of America to a fresh and healthy diet without processing and preservatives.

Quechan H.R. Department Fully Staffed

Late last year, the Quechan Tribe lost their Director of Human Resources when Mr. Reyes' wife took a "dream job" that reguired them to move to Florida. At about that same time, Patricia Barley started work as HR Clerk for the Tribe, and she stayed on when Lynette Vicente also left the department to take a lateral transfer as an Inspector for the (Arizona) Tribal Gaming Office.

But now the Human Resources Department is once again fully staffed, with a new Director, Anna Hemmer; Administrative Assistant, La Vonne Hills; and Patricia Barley is still in charge of the front desk, answering inquiries as the Tribe's Human Resources Clerk.

Anna Hemmer was born and raised in Los Angeles, California, where she attended nine years of Catholic school before graduating from Franklin High School in 1979. Anna's first year of college education at Marymount Palos Verdes Catholic College was paid for through a Los Angeles Times Women's Athletic Foundation Scholarship. Returning home from college in 1980. she began her career in banking, where she worked as a teller, vault teller, and bookkeeper for over five years.

She then took a position with Computer Sciences Corporation, holding a position in Payroll and Benefits for five years. There, while playing co-ed softball, Anna met her husband, Jack, whom she has now been married to for 21 years.

They later relocated to Las Vegas, Nevada for a year before moving to Yuma in 1994. Since then, Anna has worked as a bookkeeper for Mega Foods in San Luis, Arizona, which also required her to act as the liaison between the San Luis store and corporate office. Her respon-




