Quechan American Legion Post 802 and their Women's Auxiliary once again joined with representatives of the Quechan Tribal Council, Tribal law enforcement agencies and our elders to host a special Veterans Day ceremony on Indian Hill, commemorating a special day on the calendar.

Special guests on hand to help honor our community members who have answered the call to duty included the Yuma Sector Border Patrol Color Guard, the Winterhaven Fire Control District and the guest speaker for the day, retired Marine Master Sergeant Steven Carr.

Quechan Tribal Police Of- Game Warden John Nevels. ficer (and former Councilman and Post 802 member) Vincent Durand served as the Master of Ceremonies. He spoke of the dedication and sacrifice of service of all veterans which allow us to enjoy the freedoms present in the United States, and the civil liberties which go along with those freedoms.

Dolores Lopez, Chaplain of the Post 802 Women's Auxiliary gave the opening and closing prayers for the day, while fellow 802 members Norman and Gordon Osborne raised the flag to the national anthem, sung a capella by Quechan Fish and

Ouechan Tribe President Keeny Escalanti, Sr. stepped forward to provide the welcoming address to the assembled witnesses, before turning over the podium to MSgt. Carr (USMC retired). He spoke of his own personal experiences in Phnom Penh, Cambodia, where he served (as a Lance Corporal) on a task force searching for those still missing in action from the Vietnam War.

"When I got there, as a 21 year old Marine," he said, "I thought it was going to be 'just another mission.' But when I saw the extent of the opera-

tions, and what our veterans went through, it made me really appreciate that they made it possible for me to be standing here today . . . It's amazing what our veterans have done, and that experience helped me learn at a very young age to be really appreciative of what they have done for us."

Other guests included the Yuma sector USBP Bagpiper, Drexel Fruits, who played three songs of remembrance, and Quechan Game Warden Travis Owl, who blew Taps on the bugle while the Post 802 honor guard fired a 21-gun salute.



## **Tribal Members Invited To Show** Local Film for San Pasqual Tribe

In November of 2010, Dan Golding and Preston Arrowweed completed a project to document long suspected similarities in traditional songs sung by members of Yuman Language Tribes inhabiting the area from as far north as San Manuel, south into the Pai Pai lands of Mexico, and from the eastern edges of the Cocopah and Quechan lands all the way west to the California coast.

Working under a grant from differences in dialects. the Christensen Fund, the two Quechan Tribal members gathered together a diverse collection of well known and respected singers, to document

discuss the connections and similarities in the subjects and sung by these Tribes.

The resulting Hokan Media Productions documentary, "Songs of the Colorado," traces their investigation and presents the case that every Yuman Languade Tribe seems to carry a common cultural memory expressed in song, which only seems to be different due to the cil member for the San Pas-

## Social Services Works To Preserve Client Options

Michael Jack, Director of Quechan Social Services says his department continues to move forward despite the loss of grant funding for some important legacy programs over the past couple of years.

The lean economic times have resulted in the Arizona Department of Economic Security and the Department of Justice both ending their grant support to the Tribe's area agreement for the Family Preservation and Domestic Violence Programs. Mr. Jack said he and his staff have adapted to the cutbacks, and have moved to make progress at bringing in community partners to provide support group meetings for victims of domestic violence, in lieu of the previous program.

"Our Family Preservation/ Reunification Program services have been maintained by the Indian Child Welfare Act Program (ICWA) and will continue to be provided for all our clients who qualify for those services," Mr. Jack explains. "And our new community partner "Healing Journey" of Yuma will be offering support group meetings for victims of domestic violence here on the reservation, right at the Social Services Building. That collaboration should be finalized very soon, and we anticipate holding our first group meeting on Thursday, December 13th. They will return for their next group session two weeks later, and beginning in January they will be here for a session every week."

He says if anyone in the community would like to take part in the new program with Healing Journeys, you can call Larissa Sandman at Social Services (at (760) 572-0201) and ask to be included, even before the meetings begin next month.

In touching on the changes to the domestic violence program, Mr. Jack says the Social Services staff remains able and ready to assist with emergency protective orders, and they still have the ability to get those needing shelter into the SAFE HOUSE for women and children in either Yuma, Arizona or in Imperial County.

"Therefore, even though our funding has been reduced, the Social Services staff has been innovative and able to maintain services for the Quechan Community," he says proudly.

Social Services is also currently meeting with other service providers to create a continuum of care for their clients. They are working diligently with many service providers to provide services to clients at all levels of needs, to allow Social Services to assist in substance abuse support group meetings, parenting support groups, domestic violence support groups, and other such necessities for Social Service clients.

"The reason for developing this continuum of care is to better serve our unique client base, to support and encourage self reliance in our Tribal members," according to the Social Services Director.

Going on to describe their continuum of care, Mr. Jack had additional updates and reminders for the community on their General Assistance Program, available to eligible clients. "If a client is in need of General Assistance they should remember that all employable adults are required to register with Yuma Private Industry Council and/or Goodwill Workforce for job readiness and employment placement services, before coming in to Social Services to sign up for General Assistance."

Adults needing a high school diploma or a G.E.D must be enrolled Tribal members and provide verification. Clients with families and children are also required to apply for state Temporary Assistance For Needy Families (TANF).

"Please remember the General Assistance program is a temporary assistance and clients who become non-compliant are subject to a 60 day suspension."

Another change Social Services is encouraging will be having their clients use the YCAT busses for their daily errands that require transportation, rather than continuing the expensive prospect of having a full-time employee on staff, waiting to run out and pick up clients and take them to appointments in town.

In promoting this form of self reliance, Mr. Jack says, "Our General Assistance clients will be able to budget the YCAT bus fare out of their General Assistance funds, while clients of the ICWA Program will be assisted under client services."

He also points out that transportation will still be available for imminent needs and that Food Bank referrals and deliveries will still be maintained by the Social Services staff.

"Plus, the Quechan Elders/

Family Services is available for Elders and Adults in need of transportation assistance. But we really want our clients to learn to get around on their own for most needs, and purchasing YCAT tickets out of their support funds will really go a long way to learning how to do that."

He says the budgetary cutbacks over the past year have lead to changes in staff, services and daily office functions. As a result, The Quechan Social Services staff now includes Nickki Miguel as their General Assistance Caseworker; Charlotte Hills, Elder Family Service Caseworker; Selena Palone, Elders Transporter; Larissa Sandman, Receptionist/Clerk, Jessica Amador, File Clerk; Pierce Cachora, Social Services Transporter and, of course, Michael Jack, Director.

"The Social Services staff is dedicated to assisting the Quechan community as much as possible," Mr. Jack explains, in describing their mission. "And we encourage anyone in the community to stop by the office if assistance is needed, to make a general inquiry, or if they are just curious."

Finally, Quechan Social Services would like to thank the following: the Quechan Finance Department; Ms. Ronda Aguerro, our Tribal Vice President; Ms. Marsha Emerson, Executive Secretary; Fort Yuma Behavioral Health; the Quechan Tribal Police Department; the San Pasqual Valley Unified School District, and the Quechan Administration for their assistance, collaboration, and dedication to the Quechan community. Thank you."





Angelo is the son of Anthony Palone, an officer with the Quechan Tribal Security Dept.,




and Sandy Palone, Interim Director of the Quechan Special Diabetes Project (SDPI).


## Sprucing Up At **Elder Apartments**
