## WIA/DOL Helps Student Graduate Ahead of Her Peers

Tatianna Damon thought things were going pretty well as she began her senior year at San Pasqual High last August, looking forward to graduation along side her classmates.

Then, around the end of January this year, she learned a startling fact: "I was behind in algebra, and I wasn't going to be able to graduate with the rest of my class," she says. "I had only 190 of the 230 credits needed to graduate, and there were only four months to go until graduation day!"

But thankfully, she had the option of making up those lost credits by transferring to a course of independent studies at the San Pasqual Adult Education Center.

"Once I was on my own, a couple of people from W.I.A./ D.O.L. came by my house a few weeks later, to check up on my school status," she explains.

That previous experience gave Angie and the staff at W.I.A./D.O.L. the confidence that Tatianna would be able to easily complete the 40 credits she needed to graduate in the last few weeks remaining in the school year.

And with the help of Angela and Louann, plus Mrs. Leedom (at San Pasqual) and Angela Wright at the Bill Manes School, Tatianna successfully completed all the required workbooks and packets needed to graduate in time!

So after two months of very hard work, Tatianna was able to graduate on May 21, 2013, along with 18 other members of the Bill Manes Adult Education Class of 2013. Which, as it turns out, was three days ahead Class of 2013!

## YPG Works to Maintain Open Lines With Tribal Representatives

Tribal Council and the Cultural Committee visited the U.S. Army's Yuma Proving Ground (YPG) in late April for an aerial tour of recently "discovered" sites of archaelogical interest. The visit was part of an ongoing policy reflecting the Army's recognition of the need to protect the cultural artifacts found all around us, evidence of the daily lives of the Tribes inhabiting the lower Colorado River area.

The two days of meetings culminated with a trip to historic sites on the range. Visitors saw a confirmed prehistoric site with arrowheads and other debris from millennia past and, more intriguingly, visited a geoglyph of undetermined age. The manmade formation, consisting of a large chunk of quartz in the center of an undulating spiral

of smaller quartz stones about 20 feet in diameter, was scrutinized by several members of the Quechan cultural committee, who left undecided as to its age or authenticity. These same experts intend to return to the site for further study in the near

"It could be anything from an authentic prehistoric geoglyph to something created by winter visitors wandering around the desert creating rock art," said Young. "It is really interesting to pick their brains and see what they think."



"When I first saw it, I was thinking it wasn't genuine," said McDonald. "Now I'm leaning to that it is. The spiral is a common petroglyph element in rock art, but I haven't seen it in ground figures."

We're all partners in the community team and if we work together, it is a win-win for all concerned."





### CHR Employee Asks: "Where Have All The Years Gone?"

Greetings Relatives, Friends and Community Members;

I am hoping this finds you in good spirits. Allow me to introduce myself; my name is Bernadine Cachora.

Ouechan Tribe with a bloodline from the Mescalero and Chiricahua Apache Tribes. I have six daughters, Angela, Starla, Amber, Brandy, Derricka and Tory. I also have nine grandchildren: seven girls and two boys.

My family moved from Los Angeles, California to the Ouechan Reservation in 1972. I worked as a Nurse's Assistant at the Fort Yuma Indian Hospital from 1975 to 1978, which is where I completed my training. (Mr. Danny Thompson was the last person I had worked with there in 1978, but he has since retired from the Indian Health

On April 03, 1978 my forever best friend and I were hired as the first Community Health Representatives (CHR) Home Health Aides (HHA) by one of our past Ouechan Tribal Presidents. At that time, CHR was located at the old BIA buildQuechan Police Department.

It was there that we established the primary functions of the Home Health Aide Program.

We went through immense I am an enrolled member of the training to become knowledgeable in that field. We were trained in patient care through the IHS because as HHA's we had observed the need for after care for discharged patients.

> The Quechan CHR program has gone through many changes with everything from home visits, to transportation referrals, employees and medications as we grew along with Fort Yuma

The CHR Program has provided me with a vast amount of

courses I've taken while working here: Basic CHR Training in the South Dakota Black Hills Training Center from October 20th to November 7th, 1980; the Allied Health Care Course CHR Home Health Aide from the Indian Health Service; April 03, 1978 - April 03, 2013

ing which is now known as the the First Responders Course with the emergency medical service program; plus a defensive driving course, also at the Black Hills Training Center. I've also worked with the Elderly Area Office in Phoenix; learned about sexually transmitted diseases through training from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control; took a Wellness in Women course offered by the University of Oklahoma; and attended training on Native Youth Paths; Men and Women and Wellness and Spirituality; and Native Health Promotion and Disabilities.

#### A short history of the National CHR Program

The Indian Health Service's CHR Program was established by the U.S. Government in 1968 in response to the health needs of the American Indians. The CHR Program has been in existence for 45 years covering over 256 tribes. In 1968 a survey of the health status of both American Indians and Alaskan Natives was taken and found that many of the health problems of tribal members required a service program.

The survey concluded that these services could be delivered by indigenous health personnel familiar with Native language, customs and traditions.

The CHR program was established within the Indian Health Service (IHS) in September of 1968 with an appropriation of one million dollars for the 1969 fiscal year. Those funds authorized IHS to contract with Indian tribes for the services of providers, instructors advocates and mediators. The CHR program is a community based program that provides quality health care services. Since beginning the CHR program in 1968 there has been significant improvement in the health status of American Indians.

## Emergency Generators Installed at Tribal Offices

The Quechan Tribe took delivery of two brand new emergency diesel generators on May 29th, as part of a continuing program of improvements to help the Tribe through any sort of large scale emergency.

One generator was installed at the west end of the Tribal Administration Office, while the second was wired into the power supply at the Quechan Senior Nutrition Center. Each generator has the capacity to switch on nearly instantaneously in the event of a power blackout, to provide power to each building for at least 30 hours without the need for refueling.




