## Quechan Dictionary Milestone: Graphic Arts Contract Awarded

Last month's Quechan News contained an advertisment from the Ouechan Indian Tribe on behalf of the Tribal Council and the Language Preservation Program, requesting proposals from qualified individuals to provide Graphic Design Services for an illustrated Classroom Dictionary.

Local resident and Tribal member Kenrick Escalanti submitted a proposal to the Tribal Council, which was accepted on a vote of three in favor, one against, one absent, and two abstentions, on January 16th.

Kenrick has over 10 years of professional experience in the graphic design field, with particular expetise in print media/ magazine publication and marketing.

ed his proficiency in industry standard design software packages such as ADOBE Creative Suite, Quark Xpress and Microsoft Office, which will enable him to create the electronic files needed for print shops which may be contracted to produce the Quechan Language Classroom Dictionary.

Kenrick attended his first meeting with the other project participants on Friday, January 24th, to begin a collaborative process as part of the project team. That meeting was the first step in ensuring everyone's satisfaction with the final product.

A small group of fluent Quechan speakers has been working diligently over the last three months in choosing the specific words and subsequent phrases to be included in the dictionary.

The project budget has estimates that it will take approximately 100 hours of work by the graphic designer involved to produce the illustrations needed for the dictionary.

Several dictionary illustrations may also be incorporated into the display cases at the Quechan Cultural Center located temporarily at the Quechan Casino ♠ Resort.

The project budget anticipates printing about 1,000 copies of the completed dictionary to be used in classrooms and at home by tribal members interested in teaching the Quechan language to their children.

Some future columns may however be based on law and if so, there will be supporting information related to that.



"We have told both BLM and the big companies that are out here that any time they uncover a cultural resource we will be out here," Elder Vernon Smith told one interviewer.

"They have uncovered some bone fragments. We feel strongly that those remains may be those of our ancestors who lived here thousands of years ago. It's traditional for Ouechans to conduct these memorial services anytime something like this has turned up, so we are out here to conduct that ceremony, and we will be here all night, finishing views of the nearby mountains.

Mr. Smith made it clear when he spoke that there are a number of Quechans who still practice those ceremonies, "no matter where those bones are unearthed, no matter where anything is found which has to do with our people—we will be there." He said that no matter who has jurisdiction on the land today, "those remains are still our people, and we have to be out here to remember them."

He also said the Ocotillo Wind Project has impacted more than just the Quechan, it is also impacting those who live in the valley, with noise, dust and the constant presence of unsightly wind machines blocking the

### Bus Stop Improvements Coming to Fort Yuma

The Yuma County Intergovernmental Public Transportation Authority (YCIPTA) is adding new passenger amenities to various Yuma County Area Transit (YCAT) bus stops starting this month.

Most riders answering survey questionaires have told YCAT that what they most want to see are bus shelters and bus benches at various bus stops throughout the YCAT service area. As the demand for the transit system Drive at Railroad Avenue continues to grow each month, YCIPTA is now moving to meet those requests.

In 2013, the YCIPTA Board of Directors authorized staff to enter into agreements with Mary Kirchler of Tucson, Arizona and Creative Outdoor of Orlando, Florida to provide (at the Community Center) advertising bus shelters and bus benches throughout Yuma Cocopah Police Station County. These amenities will be provided at no cost to YCIPTA.

In addition, the Imperial County Transportation Commission is providing funding for the installation of up to two bus shelters for eastern Imperial County riders in the Winterhaven area.

YCIPTA has also worked with the Cities of Somerton and

San Luis, the Town of Wellton, and the Cocopah and Quechan Tribes, to provide additional passenger amenities at other YCAT bus stops. These include:


Dead leaves and weeds which collected in the Elder Village (above) was all cleaned up by the volunteers on a single day in January (below).





### Tribal Monitor Training Program Begins Soon

The Quechan Historic Preservation Officer (HPO) and the Quechan Cultural Committee will hold another Tribal Monitor Training Program in February and March.

Tribal Monitors work to protect historic and cultural resources by observing and recording work activities in sensitive areas. They must be able to recognize artifacts or cultural sites and take immediate action to protect them.

Quechan Tribal monitors work closely with the HPO and Cultural Committee members as well as government and private contractors (including archeologists, managers and other crew members).

Tribal Monitors must be in good health and able to work long hours under extreme conditions, walk several miles, and be able to travel to sites within a 150 mile radius. ## New Andrade Setup Limits Attempts at Avoiding Payment

Changes have been made at the Quechan Parking Lot just north of the Andrade Port of Entry, as construction workers spent the past month relocating the payment booths from the exit drive to the entryway.

Customers using the lot were previously allowed to pay on the way out, but more and more drivers lately have expressed surprise that they weren't allowed to park for free.

"A lot of people were coming back out of Mexico with no money," explained parking lot manager Chano Escalante. "And some would say they were just coming in to turn around, that they had just come into the lot accidently, and we weren't montitoring the traffic as they were coming in, so we couldn't see if they had parked or if they non-Tribal members of \$6.00 were just driving through."

The new layout also allows the staff to use the large area






A construction crew began the work in December, installing electrical conduit and new underground power for the gate arms and booths. Once the chosen site along the back of the parking lot on the entry lanes was ready, small cranes were used (at left) to transport the attendants' booths to the new location. Speed bumps were installed and painted, and the gates were put into action. Everyone using the lot (except for Tribal members) must now pay before they can park, which should increase revenues. 
