
### Tribal Government at Opening of New Federal Courtbouse Yuma

An impressive roster of local and national representatives gathered at the Pivot Point Conference Center on April 24th, to dedicate a new federal courthouse named in honor of Judge John M. Roll. Members of the Quechan Tribal Council, Tribal Court Judge Claudette White, and representatives from the Quechan EDA joined notables such as Senators John McCain and Jeff Flake, Representatives Paul Gosar, Raul Grijalva and Ron Barber. Gabrielle Giffords, who was wounded in a January, 2011 attack that left Judge Roll dead, was also present and spoke at the dedication.



Quechan Tribal Council member Emilio Escalanti was able to meet and speak personally with federal officials such as Arizona Representative Paul Gosar once the formal ceremony was completed (above). The new U.S. Courthouse is named for Judge John M. Roll, who was assasinated during an attack in Tucson which killed five others and wounded Arizona Representative Gabrielle Giffords.

### Judicial Inefficial

Basic explanations which compare and contrast our various legal systems by Quechan Tribal Court Judge Claudette White

For this month's column in the *Etska Nav Ah Pai*, I have a fairly serious message, on the subject of:

### **EXPUNGEMENTS**

If you are having a hard time finding employment due to your criminal record, or if you are trying to be licensed or approved for the placement of foster children but can't due to a previous criminal conviction, please consider participating in this upcoming event.

The California Superior Court, the District Attorney, the Public Defender, as well as volunteer Attorney Veronica Henderson and the Quechan Tribal Court are working together to coordinate an "Expungement Fair" to assist the Quechan Community and Winterhaven Community residents with the opportunity to petition the California Superior Court for expungements. Expungements may be granted on most misdemeanors.

The previously scheduled "Expungement Fair," had a fairly dismal participation rate, due to speculation and rumors that the event was a "sting" or "set-up."

The Courts and participating parties are not working to mislead people in any way. We are working together to provide a great opportunity to help people clear their records to make them more employable, licensable by agencies for various purposes and for their own personal reasons. People participating or anyone with outstanding warrants should understand though, that if you have an outstanding warrant, you should seek assistance within the Courts to clear up that matter *first*, before participating in this event. A warrant is an outstanding matter that this fair is not set up to deal with. We are at this time solely trying to help people clear their records and expunge matters which can be expunged.

Expungement is open to all Quechan Tribal Members and ALL individuals in the Winterhaven/Bard Community. And please note: Only criminal convictions in the state of California are eligible for expungement at the upcoming expungement fair.







The new "Late and Early Appointment Policy" was also shared with IHS staff members at their May 2014 general staff meeting.

The purpose of this policy is to provide a consistent patient-centered experience using appointment management practices and with the goal of maintaining access to services and minimizing loss of appointments, which restrict clinic access for (1) those who can't make it on time, (2) those that vider is ahead of their clinic Emergency Room.

She has received her Bachelor's Degree from the School of Social and Behavioral Sciences Communications. asked about what drew her to this field of study, she reflected on her life with her grandmother.

Kristen says she often found herself acting as an intermediary at times, representing her grandmother's pressing health concerns to physicians, hospital staff and others in leadership positions. She recognized that communication was both vital and essential in translating the trust her grandmother had for her into action.

"Communication provides a platform for advocacy and is essential to conveying individual information and helps facilitate decision making more effectively," she says.

Kristen received University Grants through ASU and took out student loans to pay for her tuition as she successfully maintained honors status throughout her undergraduate years while also raising her son Kodiak.

She says she dedicated her time to maintaining good grades, which allowed her to reap the benefits and support necessary to sustain her educational path. It took long hours of study, loss of recreational time, limitations on finances and created distances in relationships in order for her to maintain her good standing within the University. She has applied for entrance into Lamda Pi Eta, the Honors Society of the National Communications Association. Her short term goal is to apply her knowledge either through working on political campaigns, or public relations and strategic planning within the gaming industry or creating new avenues for organizational development. ### Social Services Director Hopes to Add ICWA Worker

Over the past few years, a series of federal and state grant reductions as well as general budgetary woes led to a reduction of staff positions at Quechan Social Services.

And though Michael Jack took over in 2012, keeping things organized and even expanding services for a short time, he was later elected to the Quechan Tribal Council, leaving Social Services in search of a full time director once again.

The search for a new Quechan Social Services Director ended in November 2013, with Dr. Rod Nelson being hired to overbut no less important Tribal department.

Dr. Nelson comes to the Tribe with a varied educational background and a great deal of experience he will be able to apply to the position. He earned his first degree, a Bachelor of Science in Political Science and Social Work from the University of Utah in 1978. From there, he attended the University of Arizona, gaining a 1981 Master's Degree in Child Development and Family Relations (Counseling Psychology). Six years later, he'd also collected a Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from William Lyon University.

Since completing his formal education, Dr. Nelson has gained nearly 30 years of experience as a licensed marriage and family therapist, psychotherapist, and a forensic interviewer in public agencies, private agencies and private University and community college level, both part-time and other details to cover the and other household items."

In the meantime, Dr. Nelson is assisted in all this by clerk/receptionist Maricela Barley and file clerk Diana Hale.

Mari says, "I am just here to be that smiling face at the door who directs you to the proper person or program, whether in person or over the telephone." She also issues referrals for agencies such as the Crossroads Mission, Quechan Housing Authority and the Yuma Community Food Bank.

"If someone needs a referral to the Yuma Community Food Bank," she explains, "they can stop by the office in person or call the office at (760) 572-0201 Ext. 21 and I can issue one to them, and then fax it directly to the food bank." Mari is also in charge of their Donation Room, which holds items that have been donated by our community for our community.

### Penelope Jefferson Completes MBA Program at the University of Phoenix

On October 18th, 2013, I still had 9 credits to go until I would complete the Masters of Business Administration Program and earn my degree. The University of Phoenix Yuma Campus is small, so their oncea-year commencement includes students who are close to finishing his or her program.

So – they allowed me to walk down the aisle with the rest of my class and stand with them as a graduate, even though I wouldn't actually pick up my diploma for another six months. The ceremony was held at the Dr. Don E. Schoening Auditorium at Arizona Western College.

In January of 2008, I began working to improve the quality of my life, which meant changing my lifestyle. The first thing I did was to become alcohol and drug free, return to church and begin looking for a job.

As an addict in recovery not many doors opened to me, and one day as I was out job hunting I mistakenly drove to University of Phoenix.

They said come on in and
